
Colleges and universities, including Allen College, continue to struggle to admit students at pre-pandemic numbers.

In the fall of 2022, Allen College received a grant that funded a full-time Community Outreach Coordinator to assist rural students in pursuing post-secondary education. Monica Berning started in this role in October of 2022, where her focus is building relationships in 38 rural high schools within a 50-mile radius of Waterloo. During this time, invitations to college and career fairs have increased immensely as has our time spent in rural high schools and hospitals. While the additional attention to health care and Allen College may not increase enrollment immediately, this position has created outreach that we have not been able to do before.

Allen College celebrates Pride Month

In June, Allen College hosted a variety of events and activities to honor Pride Month with the hope of promoting acceptance and community with our students, faculty, staff and local community.

Throughout the month, various social media posts were shared with information about the language and importance of diversity and inclusion surrounding pride month. The College hosted a Cedar Valley PrideFest t-shirt fundraiser in hopes of offering financial support to the local LGBTQ+community. Those who purchased shirts were invited to Allen College for a day of tie-dying to have unique shirts to wear to pride.

SafeZone training was held for faculty and staff. It was a 2-hour training organized by the SafeZone project to facilitate inclusive educational environments towards the LGBTQ+ community.

Additionally, a "pride week" was hosted where individuals could share their pride and be a part of the conversation of diversity and equity by having various challenges each day to show support.

The Allen Exchange

Students continued to benefit from the Allen Exchange, which initially started to address food insecurities.

This year the Exchange offered items such as food, school supplies, textbooks, bags, scrubs and other clothing. The Exchange is open 24/7 in the Barrett Forum Computer Lab.

Graduating students paid it forward by leaving their scrubs, backpacks, books and other items they used while a student at Allen College.

In addition, quick lunches and snacks were located around campus in break areas.

Everything at the Allen Exchange was free to students thanks to donations.

DPT program continues to grow and prepares for the first graduating class

Allen College's Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) program continues to become an established program.

The third cohort started in the 2023 spring semester and the program now has three matriculating cohorts. All students continue to learn a hybrid format with the majority of the didactic curriculum being delivered virtually with the students coming to campus for immersive laboratories. Students also engage in clinical learning opportunities to reinforce their didactic and laboratory learning.

The inaugural cohort which started in spring 2021 are preparing for graduation. The first graduating class for the DPT program will occur during the fall



2023 commencement activities. We are proud of these students and are excited to have Allen College graduates in the healthcare workforce as physical therapists!

Rejuvenation breaks/ end-of-term activities

For the past few years Allen College held regular events geared towards celebrating the start of terms, midterms and the end of terms.

This year, the College hosted these events as well and in addition welcomed local vendors to the events such as Bowls of Love and UnityPoint Health massage therapists. These events were geared towards helping students connect with their peers across multiple cohorts and destress from their exams and assignments.

Rural Peer Mentors

Student rural peer mentors were hired to assist with strategies identified in the rural grant. These mentors will assist with both on- and off-campus recruitment events that targeted rural students.

The rural peer mentors also help both newly admitted and current rural students by providing support and answering questions as they navigate the transition to college and beyond.



Summer Nurse and Health Careers Camp

To accommodate the busy schedules of potential camp participants, the 2023 Summer Health Careers Camp was shortened from six weeks to one intensive week from June 19 through June 23.

Nine students participated in the weeklong camp, led by Dr. Anna Weepie, Assistant Dean of Nursing and Kara Howard, Program Director, Radiography and Medical Imaging Programs. Sharon Porter, Library Assistant, also assisted with the camp.

Students participated in health care related immersive experiences, including shadowing at UnityPoint Health – Allen Hospital, healthcare exploration activities, suicide prevention program, tour of the Waverly Health Center, science learning activities at Wartburg College and college readiness activities.



Rural Health Careers Camp

A rural health careers camp was held at the Buchanan County Health Center (BCHC) in Independence on June 26, 2023, with eight students participating.

This one-day camp offered students opportunities to explore clinical and non-clinical careers in healthcare, participate in hands-on activities and life-saving training, tour the BCHS facility and learn about college readiness and habits for success.

Nursing Christian Fellowship (NCF)

This group participated in several service projects including partnering with ASNA to make tie blankets for clients in need at the ACE-SAP Free Medical Clinic and decorating/delivering cookies to the Waterloo Fire Department, Allen College administrative staff and the Waterloo Salvation Army men's and women's shelters.

The Bible study series was "Act Justly, Love Mercy, Walk Faithfully" through the National NCF Bible Study Series. They also explored the concept of Evangelism in Patient Care and related ethical considerations.

Service-Learning Honors Program



Student interest in the Honors program has been tremendous during the past academic year. Students may participate in the Honors program to fulfill their nursing elective requirement. Thus, this program is open to all traditional pre-licensure BSN students who want to give back to the community through service and volunteering.

During the 2022 fall semester, 27 students participated in the program, for a total of 405 hours (15 hours/student). During the 2023 spring semester, 19 students participated in the program, for a total of 285 hours (15 hours/student).

The students worked on projects with local community agencies to complete the required

service hours. Some students chose to complete their hours individually while others chose to work in small groups. Through these experiences, students learned more about a variety of organizations which service the community and had the opportunity to provide needed assistance to these agencies.

Scouts of America

ACE-SAP Clinic satellite clinic offers occupational therapy services

The Allen College Occupational Therapy (OT) program partnered with the ACE-SAP Clinic to provide a satellite clinic for occupational therapy. The clinic is located in McElroy Hall on the Allen College campus.

OT faculty Dr. Susan Hoey and Dr. Katie Jo Funk assisted in establishing the partnership and satellite ACE-SAP Clinic.

Dr. Hoey and Dr. Funk have had the ability to serve clients offering unique observation and learning opportunities for the Master of Science in OT students.

MS in OT's "Boundless" Program for the Waterloo Men's and Women's Facilities

The Boundless program was developed by the MS in OT program as a means of providing a unique learning opportunity for MS in OT students and the residents at the Men's and Women's facility in Waterloo.

The evening program was led by the students as part of their Contemporary and Service Delivery and Outreach Course led by faculty Dr. Katie Jo Funk.

The students presented to residents on a variety of topics with the end goal of sending the message "You are not bound to your past decisions; your future is boundless."

Some topics presented this year included communication skills, learn your personality type, balanced life, self-care/hygiene, managing relationships, me time, household chores and stress relievers.





Course-Related Community Service

Mission Nursing in Guatemala

Eight students and faculty member Dr. Abby Nieman traveled to Canilla, Guatemala in May as part of the course NU 445J: Mission Nursing. The trip was organized via Prairie Lakes Church, Cedar Falls, in partnership with Adonai International Ministries (AIM).

Prior to the trip students prepared in the classroom learning about poverty, short term missions and their impact and the Guatemalan health care system and disparities present among the indigenous (Mayan) and Latin populations.

While in Canilla, students had the opportunity to partner with AIM nurses to immerse themselves by providing nursing care, including pre-natal, pediatrics, general adult patients, and chronic adult patients. They were able to assist with vital signs, ultrasounds, heart and lung examinations, ear examinations and surgical biopsies.

Clinics were held on site in Canilla as well as in two mountain clinics. Students built educational models for obstetrical cervical checks for the nursing staff as they hope to have more deliveries in this next year.

The students put together educational activities teaching elementary school children oral and hand hygiene, overall bodily cleanliness and care.

Dr. Nieman has been the faculty member who has accompanied the students on the trip for the past several years and knows the impact this experience has on the students. Providing an opportunity for students to experience a healthcare system in a different country opens a whole new perspective for the students. Paige McDermott, a BSN student who participated in the mission trip stated: "My trip to Guatemala allowed me to see the impact that healthcare can have on a community and all of the people within it. It showed me how much we can make a difference by helping a person on their worst days."

"Diabetes Camp"

Nursing students in assistant professor Lisa Jurgensen's Community Health clinical group helped with lessons to offer a "Diabetes Camp" for kids at UnityPoint Clinic (UPC) Parkway Garden, hosted by the Lion's Club.

The camp was held every Monday in June from 9–11 a.m. at the Parkway Garden in Cedar Falls.

The camp was not only for kids with diabetes, it was intended to develop healthy eating habits, play in the garden, fix a healthy snack and do other activities. Parents were welcome at the camp as well.

Nursing students helped with lessons.



Course-Related Community Service Projects

Allen College Engagement-Salvation Army Partnership (ACE-SAP) Free Clinic

Established in 2008 as a partnership with the Waterloo Salvation Army to provide free healthcare for the underserved.

Services

- Preventive care focus: Provided full health histories, head-to-toe exams, laboratory testing and screening fairs, dental screening exams, education and referral for other services as necessary.
- Psychiatric care: Offered via psychiatric nurse practitioner students in collaboration with Black Hawk-Grundy Mental Health Center and secondary prevention through the provision of medication, monitoring supplies, durable medical equipment and patient education.
- Social determinant screening: Screened all clients and made referrals to community resources. (See more about this service on next page.)
- Sexually transmitted disease (STD) testing:
 Screened for risk factors and offered on-site STD testing and counseling through a partnership with the Black Hawk County Health Department. NP students had the opportunity to sit in on counseling sessions to gain a better understanding of how to appropriately interview and counsel patients regarding sexually transmitted infections. Black Hawk County has one of the highest rates of sexually transmitted infections in the state making this a public health issue.
- Medical dental program: Provided medical dental screening exams and fluoride treatments on-site. Referred patients with additional dental needs. Dental care remains a high need area in the community and untreated dental issues is commonly recognized as contributing to other significant medical problems such as heart disease, diabetes and poorer pregnancy and surgical outcomes. Evidence now recommends dental assessments as part of overall health assessments in primary care.

Community Service

ACE-SAP Free Clinic addresses social determinants and serves as a resource

Social Determinants of health are now recognized as having a major impact on medical outcomes. Determinants include medication affordability, food insecurity, housing instability and transportation issues. The clinic has an extensive list of programs and resources to help address these determinants.

ACE-SAP Free Clinic addresses social determinants of health for patients at the clinic and is a resource to the hospital, clinics and community as well.

In 2022, the Clinic received over 25 calls from social workers, case managers, counselors, shelters and community organizations to assist patients with affordability of their health care needs. The clinic:

- Provided many with medical equipment that they could not afford such as shower chairs, walkers, canes, crutches, splints, diabetic glucose testing kits, wound dressing supplies, nutritional supplements, incontinency briefs, hygiene supplies, catheters and ostomy supplies.
- Assisted with providing patients with gas cards/ bus passes to allow them to be able to attend medical appointments.
- Provided them with medications they could not afford. Common calls were for patients with a new diagnosis of diabetes who could not afford their insulin or testing supplies (glucose meter, testing strips, syringes and lancets). The clinic not only assisted with providing the patient with enough medication to get them through until their follow-up appointment with a provider but also provided ongoing follow up when needed.

This year, Allen College hosted the Waterloo Police Department and many vendors and partners to help build our community connections.

The evening consisted of games, a vendor hall and refreshments overseen by Allen College volunteers. Many members from the community, of all ages, attended the event and got to experience the campus.



Clinical Excellence through Interprofessional Collaboration

Inter-professional education (IPE) simulation: Allen College, University of Northern Iowa and Hawkeye Community College collaborate

An exciting new multi-disciplinary simulation scenario was implemented during the 2022 fall semester. Allen College nursing students participated in an IPE simulation experience with University of Northern Iowa athletic training students and Hawkeye Community College paramedic students.

The students cared for a patient that was injured at a volleyball game, which was portrayed by students from Columbus High and Cedar Falls High Schools. The scenario started in the gymnasium and the students were tasked with getting the patient safely transported to the simulated ambulance located in the Allen College parking lot.

From that point, the patient was cared for by paramedic students and then transported into the Allen College simulation lab where the scenario transitioned to the use of the high-fidelity manikin. Students were able to practice hand-off communications at every turning point in the scenario, and at the end of the scenario they were able to practice CPR.

The objectives for this simulation experience were:

- Understand the roles and responsibilities of the interprofessional team
- Demonstrate direct communication and teamwork with interprofessional team members
- Prioritize the immediate needs of the patient
- Implement safety measures while caring for the patient
- Complete the appropriate focused assessments throughout the scenario
- Demonstrate BLS standards while caring for the patient







Engaged faculty design creative and innovative curricula

Inter-professional ALS caregiver learning lab: occupational therapy collaborates with speech language pathology

Occupational Therapy students provided hands-on education to lowans coping with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a fatal neurodegenerative disease.

ALS family members often serve as caregivers with no model to create similar learning experiences. formal training, and they identify needs including learning about assistive devices and home modification. Through a community partnership with the ALS Association Iowa Chapter and a collaboration with University of Northern Iowa Speech Language Pathology program students developed content and prepared learning opportunities for patients and caregivers. Participants engaged in various educational stations such as safe transfers, power wheelchair basics, high tech communication, caring for themselves as caregivers and adaptive equipment for daily living tasks.

This student led interprofessional hands-on learning opportunity is unique in the state of lowa and has been found to be beneficial for caregivers, patients and students. Students report increased comfort level with caregiver education and demonstrate improved clinical reasoning, which prepares them to provide client-centered care. OT programs in at least two other states are now using this caregiver learning lab as a

Graduate therapy programs collaborations

In the 2023 spring semester, Allen College physical therapy (PT) and occupational therapy (OT) students met with speech pathology students from the University of Northern Iowa to review and analyze a paper case via a virtual Zoom meeting. Each group of students gave a presentation on what each profession would do for the specific case and how each discipline works together in a patient care setting. The students broke into smaller groups and did a deep-dive analysis of the case and then presented the case as a whole to better understand how the professions work collaboratively in the clinic setting.

The event was such a successful learning opportunity for the students that a similar event has been schedule for the 2023-2024 academic year. The event will be expanded to an in-person event where the PT, OT and UNI speech students can interact, tour each respective professions educational space, learn about clinical collaboration and socialize.

In the 2022 fall semester the PT students had a presentation by the OT director and OT students on assistive technology in the clinic. It was a hands-on

interaction with OT students instructing and the PT students able to try different types of assistive technology. The PT and OT students discussed the similarities of technologies between the professions and the PT students had a much better understanding of how the OT technology was assisting with patient rehabilitation.



Leverage existing partnerships & seek new opportunities for collaboration

School of Nursing Community and Public Health Nursing course partners with Camp Courageous

A new community partnership was created with Camp Courageous, located in Monticello, Iowa. Camp Courageous provides year-round recreational and respite care opportunities for individuals with special needs.

Nursing students enrolled in NU450 Community and Public Health Nursing were given the opportunity to complete their agency clinical hours at Camp Courageous during the camp's respite weekends in the fall and spring semester. During this experience students were able to perform a variety of clinical nursing skills while working in the camp's medical office, including medication administration and working with gastric tubes, catheter care and bowel treatments.

In addition, students were able to interact with the campers and participate in several of the camp events throughout the weekend, which included taking a ride on the zip line. Students had the opportunity to stay the night at Camp Courageous in their on-site lodging which allowed them to maximize their time at the camp.

Students who participated had a positive reaction to the clinical experience. They overwhelmingly agreed it was a rewarding experience and they gained useful knowledge about this target population that they will undoubtedly use when working with and advocating for individuals with special needs.



Collaboration for Adaptive Aquatic Therapy and Safety (CAATS)

The CAATS program was developed in collaboration with Panther Academy for Water Safety, University of Northern Iowa Speech Pathology (SLP), Allen College Master's Occupational Therapy (OT) Program and local Cedar Falls Special Education Classrooms.

In the fall semester, integrated as part of the pediatric didactic lab experiences, Allen OT students and UNI SLP students are paired with a child to provide intervention within an aquatic setting weekly. Students developed

interprofessional skills while gaining hands-on experience with the pediatric population.

Feedback regarding the experience from graduate students, teachers and paraeducators was overwhelmingly positive.

The Master of Science in Occupational Therapy program looks forward to continuing this partnership for exceptional hands-on service learning.



Leverage existing partnerships & seek new opportunities for collaboration

Allen College partners with rural health centers to offer summer camps

Allen College faculty and staff hit the road partnering with staff at Buchanan County Health Center in Independence to offer the first ever Rural Summer Camp in June. All of the schools affiliated with the rural grant within a 30-mile radius of the hospital were invited to attend. There was no cost to participate.

Participants:

- Explored clinical and non-clinical careers in healthcare
- Participated in hands-on activities and lifesaving training, including Stop the Bleed and CPR
- Engaged in college-based sessions, including study skills and college preparation
- Toured the facility and departments
- Connected with hospital staff in a variety of positions in an interview-style panel format to learn more about their careers and ask questions

Health Careers Club

Staff also partnered with Community Memorial Hospital in Sumner to offer its first health careers club in May. In this particular club, students from one specific rural high school came to the hospital to participate in a day-long immersive experience to learn more about careers in nursing, imaging and surgery.

Community Memorial Hospital plans to work with Allen College and other rural high schools in future semesters to offer clubs of a similar nature. The Community Outreach Coordinator also plans to connect with other rural hospitals to develop a similar concept.



Nursing Fundamentals: Oxygenation

Fundamentals of Clinical Nursing is the first clinical course students take in the BSN curriculum, learning content related to nursing care for physiological health. The course has classroom, laboratory and clinical components. One unit taught in Fundamentals is care of the client with altered oxygenation.

For the lab component a course objective is for students to demonstrate competency in performing basic nursing skills, which is done through students learning the skill in the laboratory setting and performing the skill on clients under the supervision of clinical instructors in the hospital.

Kally Wadding-Frisch, a Master of Science Nursing student enrolled in the education track, taught the oxygenation unit. Wadding-Frisch designed an interactive lab utilizing pig lungs. She created a simulated chest cavity allowing students to see how a chest tube and closed chest drainage system help maintain correct lung pressures. Students were able to manually inflate the pig lungs and were able to see where air and gas exchange takes place at the alveolar level.

This was a highly creative way to apply theory content to direct skills learning.

New nursing curriculum: Allen College offering 12-month and 24-month programs

In order to meet the needs of today's college students, Allen College's School of Nursing implemented new curricula for both the traditional and accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) tracks.

After conducting a comprehensive analysis and comparisons of data, the accelerated track of the BSN program will be offered over 12 months (three semesters) and the traditional track will be offered over 24 months (four semesters).

These revised curricula will provide students with an immersive clinical experience throughout their program to enhance their education and the transition from student to practicing nurse. Ongoing collaboration with clinical partners will continue to be essential to provide exceptional preparation for practice.

These changes represent meticulous planning by the BSN leadership and faculty to continue to provide the educational opportunities to allow our graduates to maintain the exemplary graduate outcomes in both certification scores and job placement.

Since the beginning of 2021, Allen College's NCLEX RN pass rate is 98.29% (234 test takers) compared to the national average of 79.78% for all RN programs over the same time frame.

The new curricula started in 2023.







Courses built on Quality Matters standards

Allen College courses are built upon program specific templates that incorporate **Quality Matters (QM)**, which is a leader in quality assurance for online education and nationally recognized for its peer-based approach and continuous improvement in online education and student learning.

Use of these templates not only help ensure that best teaching practices are being used, but they also ensure a consistent experience for the students.

A QM Certified course ensures all elements within a course serve a purpose and have been carefully selected and designed utilizing best teaching practices and alignment with course objectives, ultimately leading to better student outcomes.

Allen College hosted fall meeting CHACU

Allen College hosted the fall meeting of presidents and provosts from the Consortium of Hospital-Affiliated Colleges and Universities (CHACU) October 3–4.

CHACU is a 28-member consortium of colleges offering nursing and health sciences programs that are directly affiliated with a healthcare organization.

The meeting consisted of several professional development presentations as well as discussion of best practice related to conversion of students to employees for the parent organization, marketing/recruiting strategies and financial incentives for students.

Medical Imaging program graduates are filling staffing needs in radiology departments

Allen College's Medical Imaging (MI) program has been producing graduates who are filling critical staffing needs in computed tomography (CT) and magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) departments.

Over the past several years, radiology departments have been reporting the difficulties of staffing these specialty imaging modalities and have needed to resort to using contract staffing (often referred to as "travelers") or reducing hours which can negatively impact patient care.

The MI program has an innovative curriculum that is designed to allow graduates from a radiologic technology (X-ray) program, including Allen College's, to work as a radiographer and take MI classes online.

The MI faculty assist the students in finding clinical placements for their MI modality in a location that is most convenient for the student. The MI program curriculum was purposely designed to allow students who already have a radiologic technology credential to earn a bachelor's degree as well as an additional imaging certification. Being a dual-certified imaging specialist is helping reduce the staffing challenges healthcare systems are facing by being eligible to work in multiple areas within the radiology department.

A special thank you to Allen College grantwriter **Susan Decker** who assisted Dr. Liu in submitting the grant to the Parkinson's Foundation.

Dr. Venita Lovelace-Chandler, professor, was awarded the Catherine Worthingham Fellow of the American Physical Therapy Association, the association's highest membership category. She is the longest serving site visitor for CAPTE and is a founding member of the APTA's Academy of Pediatric Physical Therapy.

Dr. Lovelace-Chandler and adjunct faculty Dr. Margaret McGee presented at the Academy of Pediatric Physical Therapists conference. Their presentation, entitled "Review of Systems During the Annual Physical Therapy Visit," was shared with a room full of pediatric physical therapists from around the country.

Dr. Kate Reiter, associate professor, had a poster selected for presentation at the 2022 lowa Occupational Therapy Association Conference in October. The poster was entitled: "The Continuing Education Needs and Preferences of Rural Occupational Therapy Practitioners in lowa."

Dr. Sarah Steele, professor, was awarded the Allen College DAISY Award for Faculty at Allen College.

Dr. Kendra Williams-Perez, dean, was elected to the 2023 Nominating Committee of the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), which acts independently in reviewing the qualifications of applications who are nominated for positions on the CCNE Board of Commissioners and for service on the CCNE Nominating Committee.

This is a tremendous honor. Allen College students will benefit from the knowledge that Dr. Ollendieck will gain – to be the best, our students learn from the best.


Faculty recognized at state meeting





Allen Foundation works to secure grant funding for a variety of Allen College capital projects as well as campus and community-based programs. The dollars raised bolster the College's finances, enhance student education and strengthen community connections.

U.S. Department of Education Rural Postsecondary and Economic Development \$1.2 million grant progress

With the \$1,224,179 grant, which was reported in the 2021-2022 Annual Report, Allen College created the Rural Student Success Program (RSSP). The overall goals of the RSSP are to 1) increase the number of rural high school graduates who enroll in college and are retained through completion of their degree, 2) increase the number of community partnerships to support rural students and promote higher education in healthcare fields 3) increase the number of rural lowa students who get a paid internship or employment and 4) increase the number of articulation agreements with local colleges to encourage transfers to Allen College.

The RSSP strategic initiatives takes a three-pronged approach: 1) increase rural partnerships and community engagement, 2) expand and enhance rural student support services and 3) provide financial assistance specifically for rural students. Allen College is making systemic changes to increase the capacity and effectiveness of our outreach efforts, student support services, and community partnerships. Activities include creation of a Rural Student Grant and Rural Student Success Center; addition of rural peer mentors; creation of a new position - Community Outreach Coordinator; and expansion of existing partnerships and creation of new partnerships with rural secondary and post-secondary schools, rural organizations, rural healthcare employers, and community members.

Numerous activities are underway since the start of the grant. During the first six months,

- Monica Berning was hired as the Community Outreach Coordinator and is implementing the grant initiatives.
- 50 new partnerships were created in rural high schools, community colleges and hospitals.
- 20 BSN and ASR students were awarded \$6,600 in Rural Student Grants either distributed over the first and second or second and third semesters at Allen College. Over \$700,000 of the grant is allocated for these grants with the goal of supporting 110 students over three years.

The Rural Student Success Center was created and provides students with information and assistance.

Campus Improvements

- To increase student satisfaction and success, headphones and white noise machines were purchased for students to use in the student library pods when studying and testing.
- As a security measure, added badge access for some faculty and staff office areas.
- New Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) Anatomy Lab Opened (pictured below)
 Construction on the anatomy lab located on fifth floor of UnityPoint Health Allen Hospital was completed, and it opened in February 2022.
 - This lab has several plastinated cadaver parts and at least two full body plastinated cadavers (pictured below).
 - Plastinated cadavers originate in Germany and are actual human bodies (cadavers) that have been preserved in plastic for anatomical viewing.
 - The opportunity to view the human body as a cadaver is a privilege afforded to few people. It carries with it the responsibility to treat the person who has given his/her body to advance education and research with respect and dignity.
 - In the Allen College anatomy lab, students will have the opportunity to view human cadavers that are skinned, have parts that are displayed separately (arms, legs, hands, feet), internal organs, and male and female anatomy.








Student Financial Aid

- Allen College continues to seek out new grant and scholarship opportunities to assist our students while also working closely with Allen Hospital on recruitment efforts to address workforce needs.
- The Student Financial Services team hosted student events throughout the academic year to remind and encourage students to complete their scholarship application and FAFSA application.

Graduates may have debt from other colleges attended; however, that amount is unknown to Allen College and not included with the figures.

Additional financial support for students

Allen College continuously seeks additional financial support and resources for students. In 2022-2023 the College was successful in securing several new sources of financial resources for students.

Last Dollar Scholar

Allen College received Last Dollar Scholar designation for the radiography program by the Iowa College Aid Commission (ICAC) for the Associate of Science in Radiography (ASR) program.

This program provides a tuition offset for students enrolled in the ASR program after all state and federal grant and scholarship aid has been applied.

Schools are eligible for participation that offer undergraduate programs that lead to associates degrees or certificates in professions that are considered high need by the lowa Workforce Development. Students need to meet eligibility criteria including either graduating from an lowa high school or establishing residency in lowa as determined by ICAC guidelines.

At a time when costs continue to rise, this program will provide much needed financial support for these students.

Rural Grant Awards

Undergraduate students who meet qualifications for the rural grant may be eligible to receive a grant for \$6,600 for their first two semesters (or second and third semesters for ASR students).

Grant Year 1 ends September 30, 2023, with projections of awarding \$79,200 in grants to approximately 20 students. If there are any unspent grant funds for student awards from Year 1, the College will seek approval to allocate them for students awards in Year 2 of the grant.

The purpose of these awards is to recruit more rural students to Allen College in hopes of diversifying the student body. In addition, these awards will help students overcome financial barriers that may prevent them from otherwise being able to pursue a degree.

You Matter Award

Funds raised during the fall 2022 Annual Day of Giving created the new "You Matter" Award to assist students in need of closing the gap between other financial aid and their remaining tuition balance. The fund is designed to retain students at Allen College who may be a little short being able to cover their tuition and fees in a semester due to unforeseen circumstance or variety of other barriers. The creation of this fund demonstrates to students how much they matter to Allen College and our willingness to support them in a time of need.

UnityPoint Health colleges collaborate on student information system

The three colleges of UnityPoint Health, Allen College, St. Luke's College (Sioux City) and Trinity College of Nursing & Health Sciences (Rock Island, IL) are collaborating on a new Student Information System (SIS). A SIS is integral for the operation of the colleges because it houses all of the student data from the point of application all the way through their educational journey.

Even though the three colleges are currently using the same SIS software, the three campuses have tailored the software for the individual campuses and there are minimal similarities in processes.

Representatives from each campus have been working collaboratively for several years to agree upon best practices that can be integrated across all campuses. The new SIS system will create more efficient processes that will benefit students across all UnityPoint Health Colleges. The new SIS will provide significant improvements in the student application process, consumer relationship management, billing/financial aid and document tracking.

The new system will be fully implemented during the 2023-2024 academic year.

Program accreditations and approvals

- The Associate of Science in Radiography (ASR) Program was awarded the maximum 8 years accreditation by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiology Technology (JRCERT). The ASR faculty, Kara Howard, Don Bishop and Michele Murphy ensured the ASR program met all of the JRCERT's standards that led to this accreditation outcome.
- ♦ The Diagnostic Medical Sonography Program was awarded the maximum 10 years accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP). The accreditation award covers both the obstetrics and gynecology specialty as well as the abdominal-extended program. The DMS program faculty, Evalene Martin, Lisa Bindert and Cheyenne Gosse, submitted all of the necessary information to CAAHEP that led to this outstanding accreditation outcome for our DMS program.
- The School of Nursing's Nursing Education Report was accepted by the Iowa Board of Nursing, and they granted approval for the maximum six years to the Bachelor of Science in Nursing, RN to BSN, Master of Science in Nursing, Post-Graduate certificate and Doctor of Nursing Practice programs.

Trustee Dr. Jeffrey Crandall recognized

Dr. Jeffrey Crandall was recognized at the fall 2022 commencement ceremony for his service to Allen College as a member of the Board of Trustees since 2015.



Dr. Crandall completed his final term as an Allen College Trustee at the conclusion of the 2022 calendar year. During his tenure as a Trustee, Dr. Crandall helped oversee several significant initiatives including the addition of the graduate therapy programs, record enrollments, campus improvements and an increase in the College's endowment including doubling the institutional scholarship program.

The site visit team met with the DPT faculty, students and various staff and College leaders.

At the conclusion of the visit, the site visitors provided a summary of the visit which was positive and reflective of the tremendous amount of work the DPT faculty and our team put into the self-study and on-site visit.

The next CAPTE Board meeting will be held on October 27–30, 2023 at which time a final decision will be made regarding Allen College's accreditation. Allen College will be notified of the decision no later than November 30.
