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From the President



Dear Allen College Community -

I am very proud to share with you the 2023-2024 Allen College Annual Report. As a sports fan, hockey in particular, it dawned on me that Allen College and Wayne Gretzky have something in common. The number 99. Wayne Gretzky, arguably the greatest hockey player of all time who transformed his sport, wore the number 99 throughout his career and had his number retired by the National Hockey League. Allen College is in it's 99th year of existence as a healthcare education entity with our roots tracing back to the diploma school of nursing which began in 1925. Allen College has transformed healthcare education over 99 years, and we

continue to evolve as an educational institution to meet the needs of today's students. Particularly, in the last year we have launched several initiatives to make Allen College a destination for students wishing to pursue healthcare education. This report highlights many of those initiatives but I want to focus on a few right now.

The School of Nursing underwent a curricular transformation of both the accelerated and traditional Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) programs. The accelerated BSN curriculum was renovated to be a 12-month, 3-semester program and the traditional BSN program was redesigned to a 4-semester curriculum. These changes were enacted to provide more opportunities for BSN students to choose Allen College to help them meet their educational goals without sacrificing the quality education for which we are known and recognized.

The Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) program achieved a significant milestone in 2023 when the program was awarded "accredited" status by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE). Earning CAPTE accreditation was the final step in the development of the DPT program and it allows us to move from the developing program phase to establishing our program into one of the highest performing DPT programs in the Midwest.

Saving the best accomplishment for last, in 2023, Allen College was recognized by ModernThink[™], and shared by *The Chronicle of Higher Education*, as a Great College to Work For with an Honor Roll distinction! I could not think of a more fitting way for our faculty and staff to be recognized for their incredible passion and dedication in helping our students fulfill their potential and achieve their academic goals. This recognition directly reflects how special the people are who work at Allen College and their work is highlighted throughout this Annual Report. As you read through this report, I hope you share the same sense of pride that I have by the amazing work that is performed here and how Allen College graduates are making a difference in the healthcare profession!

The 2024 Summer Health Careers Camp was held from June 24-28. Fourteen 9th-12th grade students participated in the weeklong camp, led by Dr. Anna Weepie, Assistant Dean of Nursing and Kara Howard, Program Director, Radiography and Medical Imaging Programs.

This camp offered students opportunities to explore healthcare careers, participate in handson activities and interact with healthcare professionals and students.

Community Memorial Hospital in Sumner and Buchanan County Health Center in Independence provided job shadowing opportunities to all students. Campers participated in health careers exploration at UnityPoint Health – Allen Hospital. Additional experiences provided include suicide prevention training and college readiness activities including talking with the financial aid team and recruiters from Allen College, Hawkeye Community College and Wartburg College.

Course-Related Community Service



Boy Scouts

OT students hosted a disabilities awareness event through their Contemporary Service Delivery and Community Outreach course. The students planned and organized a program for scouts and their leaders.

The participants learned myths and truths about persons with disabilities and discussed ways to advocate for and include others. They participated in hands-on activities to explore accessibility and learn about equipment that promotes participation for all individuals.

The scouts also learned about healthcare careers and each participant earned a disability awareness merit badge.

Cedar Falls Schools preschool and special education classrooms

OT students visited Cedar Falls Schools preschool and special education classrooms as part of their OT in the school's coursework.

The routine of the classroom and varying teaching approaches were observed. The students were able to play and interact while completing their visits.

Northeast Iowa Food Bank and the House of Hope Women's Shelter

As part of their Health and Wellness class OT students volunteered at the Northeast Iowa Food Bank and the House of Hope Women's Shelter.

Through these experiences, they gained profound insights into the impact of socioeconomic status on occupational participation and occupational deprivation. They learned firsthand how economic circumstances can restrict individuals' ability to engage in meaningful daily activities and access essential resources.

By interacting with clients, they observed the challenges marginalized populations face and the role occupational therapy can play in promoting health and well-being. These experiences underscored the importance of addressing social determinants of health in therapeutic interventions, emphasizing the need for inclusive and accessible services to enhance individuals' quality of life

The students not only applied their academic knowledge in practical settings but also developed empathy and understanding that will shape their future practice as compassionate OT's.



Course-Related Community Service



Mission Nursing in Guatemala

In May, nine undergraduate nursing students and faculty member Dr. Abby Nieman traveled to Canilla, Guatemala as part of the course NU 445J: Mission Nursing. The trip was organized via Prairie Lakes Church, Cedar Falls, in partnership with Adonai International Ministries (AIM).

Prior to the trip students prepared in the classroom by learning about poverty, short-term missions and their impact. Students researched and presented on topics related to Guatemala.

While in country, students had the opportunity to immerse themselves in the Latin and Mayan population through providing nursing care. The students were partnered with AIM nurses from Canilla and the surrounding communities. Students were able to care for various populations including

pre-natal, pediatrics, general adult patients and chronic adult patients. They assisted with various health examinations and about half the students spent time in one of the local elementary schools teaching biblical related content with interactive activities.

Dr. Nieman states she feels blessed to continue to be able to take students to Guatemala each year. "The interest in this trip has increased immensely over the past couple years. We have a waiting list now for those students who want to have this experience. This is an amazing problem to have; it is showing me that more and more students have a heart for missions as well as have a heart for those who live in poverty. I am proud of our students for taking that step outside of their comfort zone to learn more about others and ultimately themselves in the process."

Course-Related Community Service

Allen College Engagement-Salvation Army Partnership (ACE-SAP) Free Clinic

Established in 2008 as a partnership with the Waterloo Salvation Army to provide free healthcare for the underserved, currently the only free clinic in the Cedar Valley. **Celebrating 15 years of service.**



Services

- Preventive care focus: Provided full health histories, head-to-toe exams, laboratory testing and screening fairs, dental screening exams, education and referral for other services as necessary. Secondary prevention is provided through the provision of medication, monitoring supplies, durable medical equipment and patient education.
- Social determinant screening: Screened all clients and made referrals to community resources. In 2023, the clinic administrator received over 30 requests from social workers, case managers, counselors, shelters and community organizations to assist individual patients/clients with affordability of their health care needs. The clinic was able to provide many patients/clients with medical equipment that they could not afford such as diabetic glucose testing kits, wound dressing supplies, nutritional supplements, incontinency briefs, hygiene supplies, catheters, ostomy supplies, shower chairs, walkers, crutches, wheelchairs, canes, splints, and toilet risers. The clinic has also assisted clients with providing them with gas cads/bus passes to allow them to be able to attend medical appointments and providing them with medications they cannot afford.

The ONLY free clinic in Iowa that is run by NURSES.

- Sexually transmitted infection (STI) testing: Through a partnership with the Allen Women's Health Clinic, the ACE-SAP Free Clinic will become a satellite clinic to their Community Based Screening Site (CBSS) with the Iowa Department of Public Health for STI testing and counseling. Logistics of the partnership are being worked through but once implemented, this would allow patients who present to the ACE-SAP Clinic to be screened for risk factors of sexually transmitted infections and offered on-site testing and counseling, rather than referring patients to an alternative site. Black Hawk County has one of the highest rates of sexually transmitted infections in the state making this a public health issue. This partnership will benefit the Allen College NP students who will gain experience screening and counseling patients regarding sexually transmitted infections.
- Medical dental program: Provided medical dental screening exams and fluoride treatments on-site. Referred patients with additional dental needs; 17 patients were referred to Hawkeye Community College Dental Clinic to receive free dental cleanings and several of these patients received additional dental services such as fillings and xrays. One patient was referred to IMOM for dental services and the clinic partnered with a local area dentist to refer 16 patients for urgent/emergent dental care and an additional 3 patients to the University of Iowa College of Dentistry for extensive dental services. All patients referred for dental care received vouchers from the ACE-SAP clinic so there were no associated costs for the patients.

Dental care remains a high need area in the community and untreated dental issues is commonly recognized as contributing to other significant medical problems such as heart disease, diabetes and poorer pregnancy and

surgical outcomes. Evidence now recommends dental assessments as part of overall health assessments in primary care.

 Occupational therapy (at satellite site): Established in 2022, the satellite ACE-SAP Clinic at Allen College provided occupational therapy.

Clinic Documentation Upgrade

- Conversion of documentation to electronic records continued. This will benefit patient confidentiality, improve medicate security and enhance record keeping and statistical data retrieval.
- Electronic record system provided by the Free Clinics of Iowa at no charge to the patients which allows greater transportability of medical records from visits to ACE-SAP.
- BSN students reviewed and updated some of the written patient teaching materials to make sure the content was accurate, easy to understand and written at a 4th-6th grade level as well as visually appropriate for commonly discussed patient education topics such as diabetic diet, heart disease, GERD, STIs and CHF. The students also added Spanish versions of the materials to assist with educational efforts.

ACE-SAP Clinic satellite clinic offers occupational therapy services

The Allen College Occupational Therapy (OT) program once again partnered with the ACE-SAP Clinic to provide a satellite clinic in Allen College's McElroy Hall for occupational therapy. OT faculty Dr. Sue Hoey and Dr. Katie Jo Funk had the ability to serve clients offering unique observation and learning opportunities for the OT students.

Anne's Orchard

A box of plums was harvested from Anne's Orchard and donated to the Salvation Army Kitchen. Despite less than ideal weather for the growing season, the orchard still produced approximately ten bushels of apples that were donated to Prairie Parkway for the Harvest and Cider Festival in October.





Health Con

Allen College hosted Health Con on September 12 for members of the community. Several activities were held across campus with the goal of providing members from our community the opportunity to come to our campus and learn more about Allen College.

Continuing Education

Cedar Valley STEM Festival

An Allen College faculty member and BSN students interacted with Cedar Valley youth and their families at the STEM festival to educate them about nursing as a health care careers.

Hands-on experiences included using a pulse oximeter, doppler and stethoscope; and they were able to learn about the human body and how it works using a virtual reality simulated t-shirt.



UNI Flu Shots

Under the supervision of Allen College faculty, 17 Allen College BSN students administered 300 influenza vaccines to UNI faculty and students. Data from this event is listed in the table at the end of the report.

Blood Drive

Two blood drives were held at Allen College. The fall blood drive collected 12 units of blood from 11 donors for a total impact of 36 lives sustained/saved. The spring blood drive collected 11 units of blood from 10 donors for a total impact of 33 lives sustained/saved.

Hawkeye Farm Show

A BSN student and faculty member performed blood pressure screening for 25 community members at the Hawkeye Farm Show.

Focus on Diabetes

ACE-SAP Clinic faculty and NP students participated in the Focus On Diabetes Community Event where they provided education on Diabetes prevention and management and performed free screening A1C testing and dental screening exam/fluoride treatments to participants.



New technology utilized in the Allen College simulation center

Nursing education has continued to support learning opportunities in a simulated environment where students can get hands on experience and immediate faculty feedback to assist in enhancing the clinical judgement in our future nursing workforce.

At Allen College, all nursing students in the undergraduate and graduate nursing programs come into the simulation center for learning opportunities every semester. Part of the learning that happens in the simulation center requires technology for viewing and reviewing simulation scenarios that students complete.

In January, the new audiovisual system was installed in the simulation rooms. Intelligent Video Solutions with the Video Audio Learning Tool (VALT) system has allowed for better viewing of the simulations for students who were not physically in the space while peers were working with the "patient." This system has also provided the opportunity for all simulations to be saved for viewing at a later time, if needed.

The International Nursing Association of Clinical and Simulation Learning (INACSL) best practice standards of simulation does encourage that all simulations should be recorded, especially if any type of evaluation is occurring with the student's interactions with the patient.

Not only has the installed system worked very well for the simulation experiences, but the College also purchased a ROAM cart. The ROAM cart is a mobile unit faculty can take anywhere that is on the UnityPoint network and can record simulations happening in any of the various environments. For example, if faculty wanted to simulate a person in cardiac arrest in the student center at Allen College, faculty would set the roam cart up in that space and have the same recording capabilities as if they were in the simulation center. This mobile access has been used to accommodate some of the interprofessional simulation experiences that students participate in with various healthcare profession students in other lab spaces on Allen College's campus.

All of the technology for this audiovisual system is run by simulation faculty during the sessions in the control room of the simulation center. Faculty were trained on how to use the software and the features to provide the best video capture to aid in the reviewing of the simulation session.

Since the VALT system installation in January 2024, more than 140 hours of simulation experiences has been recorded. The support for the installation of this new AV system is much appreciated.

The recording software enables faculty to capture multiple angles of the care provided, along with a close look at what the patient's vital signs are doing during the time of care.

Faculty can zoom the camera in as close as needed to be able to see if the students are performing a skill correctly or giving the correct amount of medication.

Engaged faculty design creative and innovative course curricula

First cohort graduated from the 12-month accelerated BSN program



While the curriculum is condensed, it is not less.

The culture of Allen College supports students success in this compressed delivery model.



The BSN accelerated track curriculum transitioned from 15 or 16 months to 12 months beginning with the cohort entering May 2023.

After completing a minimum of 70 general education and pre-requisites required credit hours, these students began the rigorous path to a BSN, completing an additional 54 nursing credit hours. This involved an expected weekly time commitment of 60-70 hours of class, lab, clinical and studying.

One graduate commented, while she was "terrified, and she knew it would be difficult, she had already completed a 4-year degree and wanted a fast-track to getting my nursing degree." A common misconception is that it's 12 months, something must be left out. But that is not the case. While the curriculum is condensed, it is not less. The culture of the Allen College supports student success in this compressed delivery model.

Occupational Therapy live lab experiences

OT students had the unique opportunity to complete a live lab evaluation experience as part of their fall pediatric coursework.

OT students completed an evaluation on community volunteers that included conducting an interview with the caregiver and interacting with the children to assess development and other skills and potential completion of a standardized assessment.

An OT student commented, "After this experience, I felt more ready and prepared for what I may see on fieldwork. At one point I thought, wow, I really can do this!"



Clinical Excellence through Interprofessional Collaboration

Interprofessional OSCE

In April, faculty from the Allen College nurse practitioner (NP) program and the occupational therapy (OT) program collaborated to provide inter-professional Objective Standardized Clinical Exams (OSCEs) for students in their final semester of coursework. The OSCEs utilize standardized patients in a simulated setting to assess students' clinical skills and clinical reasoning.

First-year OT students were provided with case histories and acted as standardized patients. NP students completed an evaluation of the standardized patient while the second year OT students observed.

The OT student then received a "referral" from the NP student with a brief report of findings and completed an evaluation of the patient while the NP student observed. The students were expected to interact with the "patient" just as they would in a real situation.

The team then debriefed and discussed the experience and their respective roles in the primary care setting. Student responses following the OSCEs were very positive.



One student stated, "I was able to gain a lot of confidence from this experience!" Another expressed, "I learned what the collaboration process looks like, and I gained so much from this experience."


Interprofessional experience for occupational therapy, physical therapy and speech language pathology students

Many students reported their biggest take-away from the experience was learning that working together can result in better outcomes for patients and can lower healthcare costs. In March 2024, students and faculty from the Allen College Master of Science in Occupational Therapy and Doctor of Physical Therapy programs met with students and faculty from the University of Northern Iowa Speech-Language Pathology Program for a virtual interprofessional educational (IPE) experience.

Students worked collaboratively on a case study, shared information about their respective professions/programs and had discussions about how they can work collaboratively in practice.

Students from the various programs commented they enjoyed learning firsthand about another healthcare discipline.

DEU 10 Year Anniversary

During the fall semester Allen College School of Nursing BSN program celebrated the 10-year anniversary of using the dedicated education unit (DEU) model of clinical education with UnityPoint Health – Allen Hospital.

Rita Borrett, RN, Allen Hospital nurse manager and Dr. Sarah Steele, Allen College professor, traveled to Portland, Oregon to learn more about the concept before setting up the DEU.

The DEU is a clinical learning model designated to deliver more targeted learning opportunities and enhance student nurses learning capacity. It provides students with greater opportunities to develop their skills and build their professional nursing identity (Williams, et al., 2021). This innovative approach began on 4 Surgical and has since expanded to the other medicalsurgical units at Allen Hospital. Staff nurses serve as clinical instructors for two students, Allen College faculty provide support on each clinical day and students participate in consecutive days of clinical for entire shifts.

The model has led to accomplishment of goals for both partners. While countless Allen College BSN students have experienced an immersive clinical experience, increased collaboration with health care providers and applied theory to realworld practice, Allen Hospital has been able to address the nursing shortage through enhanced recruitment and retention and address the perceived practice gap and lack of student readiness for professional practice.

Radiography student posters place at seminar

Level 2 ASR students attended the Iowa Society of Radiologic Technologists (ISRT) Student Educator Seminar in Des Moines in April. All students submitted a professional poster at the seminar.

Of the three posters that placed for a cash prize, two Allen College ASR posters were selected. Brianna Jordan earned 2nd place for her poster on Gossypibomas. Marra Fitzgerald and Jenna Hauser earned 3rd place for their poster on Lower Extremity Fractures.



ASR Student Accepted to Leadership Development Program

Georgie Schuerer, an ASR May 2024 graduate, was selected into the American Society of Radiologic Technologists (ASRT) Student Leadership Development Program (SLDP). This is a three-year program that offers students an opportunity to learn about the ASRT, receive expanded opportunities for professional growth and development and network with medical imaging and radiation therapy professionals.

New RN-DNP Track

The School of Nursing has implemented a new graduate nursing degree for students seeking advanced education with the opportunity to pursue a Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) degree directly from associate degree (ADN) or diploma nursing preparation. Admitted students will be required to complete the necessary pre-requisites and articulation credits, in addition to the first 27 credit hours of the program of study, at which point 124 total credits will be awarded. Students will be classified as graduate students upon admission, allowing students to simultaneously take courses that meet requirements of the BSN and the DNP degrees.

The RN-DNP track will contain two new courses which will serve as a bridge from the associate degree or diploma in nursing to graduate education. In addition, these two courses, in combination with a portfolio, will allow students to demonstrate the entry-level competencies of *The* *Essentials* (AACN, 2021). The bridge, or transition, courses must be completed during the first two semesters of enrollment.

The proposed timeline is a fall 2024 start date. Students may be admitted and enroll both fall and spring terms. Concomitantly, with implementation of the RN to DNP track of the DNP program, the RN to BSN track of the BSN program has been discontinued. RN-BSN programs throughout the state are facing decreasing enrollment. According to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN, 2023), nationwide RN to BSN enrollment declined for the fourth consecutive year, with enrollment decreasing by 19.9% in 2022. Enrollment in the Allen College RN to BSN program has remained low over the past four years with an average enrollment of 507 students. Of those seeking enrollment in Allen College's RN to BSN program, the majority have a goal to continue with graduate education to become an advanced practice registered nurse. The new RN to DNP option will meet this need.



Partnerships & Collaboration

Leverage existing and new partnerships and collaboration opportunities

ALS caregiver learning lab



Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), also called Lou Gehrig's Disease, is a fatal and devastating illness for which it is difficult to cope.

Through a community partnership with the ALS Association Iowa Chapter and a collaboration with the University of Northern Iowa Speech and Language Pathology program, Allen College occupational therapy (OT) students developed hands-on learning opportunities for patients and caregivers struggling with the effects of ALS.

Families engaged in various educational stations such as safe transfers, power wheelchair basics, high-tech communication, caring for themselves as caregivers and adaptive equipment for daily living tasks.

This student-led interprofessional handson learning was beneficial for caregivers, patients and students. Students reported increased comfort levels with caregiver education and demonstrated improved clinical reasoning, which prepares them to provide empathetic and client-centered care.

Graduate therapy programs collaborate in Turks and Caicos


In August of 2024 the Allen College Occupational and Physical Therapy programs partnered with the Department of Education in Turks and Caicos, Therapy Abroad (https://www.therapyabroad.org/) and the University of Northern Iowa Speech and Language Pathology program to provide a camp for children with disabilities in Turks and Caicos. The clinic was located on the island of Grand Turks, where both faculty and students were met with amazing support for the camp from the Turks and Caicos government.

Allen OT faculty, Dr. Denise Dermody and PT faculty, Dr. Erica Kiernan assisted in establishing the provision of OT/ PT services embedded into the camp using interdisciplinary consultation in collaboration with each other and speech therapy faculty and staff.

Allen College students had the ability to serve these children with disabilities which offered valuable multicultural, experiential learning opportunities to develop many vital skills including clinical decision-making, problem-solving, consultation, collaboration, interdisciplinary communication and cultural humility.

Partnerships & Collaboration



Collaboration for Adaptive Aquatic Therapy and Safety (CAATS)

The CAATS program was developed with the leadership of UNI's Panther Academy for Water Safety (PAWS) in partnership with Allen College OT students, UNI speech and language pathology (SLP) students and local Cedar Falls special education classrooms.

Integrated as part of pediatric didactic work, Allen OT students and UNI SLP students are paired with a child to provide intervention within an aquatic setting weekly. Students can develop interprofessional skills while gaining hands-on experience with the pediatric population. Feedback from children's teachers and paraeducators was overwhelmingly positive.

An OT student stated, "This opportunity has been beyond beneficial in providing me a strong foundation for pediatric experiences to come. I love that I could make these connections with kids and other professionals while enrolled at Allen College. The hands-on opportunities are amazing!"

Allen College continues to collaborate with rural health centers to offer events to high school students

In year two of the rural grant, Allen College continued to tap into Careers Club in conjunction with existing partnerships with **Community Memorial Hospital** (CMH) in Sumner and Buchanan County Health Center (BCHC) in Independence to offer hands-on learning opportunities for rural high school students to learn more about careers in healthcare. A new partnership was created with MercyOne in New Hampton.

CMH in Sumner hosted three events in the 2023-2024 academic year. At these events high school students had opportunities to participate in hands-on learning in therapy, nursing, surgery, imaging and lab. BCHC hosted their first Health Allen College in spring 2024. This event allowed students to go through sessions in stop the bleed, interosseous, radiology, lab and physical therapy. Allen College partnered up with Northeast Iowa Community College (NICC) to offer a similar event at MercyOne in New Hampton offering students handson learning sessions in nursing, physical therapy and radiology.

These hands-on experiences also led students to making connections with staff at the hospitals, which in some cases, led to job shadows and further career exploration.



Mentoring – Women in Healthcare Organization

Allen College faculty and students collaborated with the Women in Healthcare Organization from UNI. Allen College students assisted with mentoring UNI students who have an interest in various health care professions.

Community college partnerships fuel public health program

Every student enrolled at Allen College transfers in from another college. For example, nursing students take three years of general education and prerequisites at a partner college like Wartburg or Coe, then finish their studies at Allen. But the public health degree is a little different.

"We have students coming in after they graduate with an associate degree in a health field like dental hygiene or radiography, but we also have students who have only finished their general education courses," said Dr. Whitaker, public health program director.

Starting in 2019, Allen College started an agreement with Hawkeye Community College's dental hygiene program to take students on their waitlist into the public health degree. This allowed students who would have otherwise been out of college to take the public health curriculum at Allen College during their waitlisted year, then attend the dental hygiene program. Once they finish their dental hygiene courses, then student has enough credits to graduate with both degrees.

Since the program began five years ago, about half of the students in the public health degree have been referred from the partnership with Hawkeye Community College. Its success has led to an additional partnership with Indian Hills Community College, whose former director completed her bachelor's degree through the Allen College public health program. And now this idea of using the program to keep students engaged in the gap year is hitting closer to home.

This fall, Allen College will be offering the option of attending the public health degree to radiography students who are waiting to get into the program. "I think it creates an amazing opportunity," said Kara Howard, director of radiography and medical imaging. "Having a bachelor's degree along with the technical skills of a radiographer will allow these students to move into leadership positions much more quickly."

It is not just students in gap years that keep the program going. The program was originally conceived as a completion degree for health professionals and has stayed true to that mission. Recently, three students have used

the public health

degree to transition from their associate degree to graduate degrees.

Among those, Bravden Biermann completed his associate in physical therapy assisting at Hawkeve Community College, used the public health degree to get to a bachelor's degree, and then graduated in the first cohort of the Allen College Physical Therapy



program in December 2023. Dr. Biermann now practices in rural Northeast Iowa.





Allen Foundation secures grant funding for a variety of Allen College capital and academic projects as well as campus and community-based programs. The dollars raised enhance student education and help meet critical healthcare needs in our community.

ACE-SAP Clinic Receives Grant for Dental Services

The Allen College Engagement – Salvation Army Partnership (ACE-SAP) Free Clinic was awarded a \$5,000 grant from the Waterloo Community Foundation in November 2023. This funding is dedicated to helping uninsured, low-income clients receive dental care.

ACE-SAP partners with Hawkeye Community College's Dental Hygiene program for low-cost dental cleanings and the University of Iowa College of Dentistry for more in-depth treatment needs. Local dentists, including Dr. David Bottke (pictured with Clinic Director and faculty Sue Gettman), provide care for clients with urgent/emergent needs such as fillings and extractions. All care is provided at no cost to clients. Thanks to this funding, three clients received dental exams and cleanings, and six clients received more in-depth dental services during the first half of 2024. Grant funding runs through the end of the year allowing ACE-SAP to provide dental services for more clients in the coming months.

In 2021, ACE-SAP leadership identified dental care as a particularly urgent need for their clients. Most lacked dental insurance and access to providers to care for this vital component of their overall health. In

response, dental partnerships were formed to accommodate dental referrals for clients. According to the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services, oral health is a silent epidemic. Despite being one of the most prevalent diseases in the U.S., it frequently does not receive the attention it deserves. ACE-SAP thanks the Waterloo Community Foundation for helping us address this critical need in our community.

Rural Grant—Year One in Review

- 19 events attended which led to a total of 4,184 rural students who were directly served by grant services
- 91% retention rate of rural students
- **19 students received scholarship funding** (\$6,600 per student)
- **58 partnerships** formed in rural communities with high schools, hospitals and area education agencies
- Hosted two Counselor Visit Days to bring high school counselors to Allen College to learn more about the grant and the college as a whole

Campus Improvements

- In response to student feedback for more study areas on campus, the Musgrave Study Room was transitioned from offices to three individual private study spaces for students.
- Concrete repairs were made to the McElroy Hall patio where students enjoy lunch breaks and outside activities. This update was also in response to student satisfaction surveys.
- Nursing Skills Lab/Simulation Improvements
 - Three task trainer models were purchased for the acute care gerontology nurse practitioner track. These include an ultrasound guided central line insertion model, epidural and lumbar puncture model and a chest tube insertion model.
 - New AV equipment was installed in the simulation center that allows for better recording and viewing of simulation experiences. A ROAM cart was also purchased and this cart allows simulations to take place anywhere on campus. It is essentially a mobile AV system that will provide faculty the option to run simulations outside of the simulation center.





 A pediatric manikin, the size of a 5-7 year old, was purchased for use in the pediatric course. This pediatric manikin has the most technology out of our simulator "family" in which he can turn his head to look at the person talking, cry actual tears and be hooked up to any real hospital grade equipment for training. Students will begin using this simulator in the fall, but training has already started with the faculty that will be running the simulator hands, feet, internal organs and male and female anatomy.

Resources – Rural Peer Mentors

As part of the Rural Grant, five student rural peer mentors were hired during year one of the rural grant.

- One mentor had the opportunity to mentor a new nursing student one-on-one.
- All of the mentors had the opportunity to assist with welcoming prospective and new rural students to campus through Campus Visit Day, Day in the Life and Orientation.
- Two of the mentors assisted with events promoting careers in healthcare to rural high school students at rural hospitals.

- Allen College worked through the implementation of a new student information system to better serve students through the entirety of the 2023-2024 academic year and successfully went live with the new system for summer 2024.
- The Student Financial Services team attended many online trainings, webinars, virtual conferences and read through extensive materials to stay up to date on the 2024-2025 FAFSA Simplification Act changes that impacted the entire 2024-2025 federal aid system. The financial aid cycle for the 2024-2025 year began in October 2023. Financial aid staff are usually working with two academic years at a time.

Collaborations with UnityPoint Health colleges

The three UnityPoint Health Colleges (Allen College, St. Luke's College and Trinity College of Nursing & Health Sciences) collaborated on several projects during the 2023-2024 academic year.

New SIS: For the past several years, the three Colleges have been in the planning phases of implementing a new student information system (SIS) from the vendor Anthology. The new SIS was implemented during the 2023-2024 academic year and manages all aspects of student records including admissions materials, grades, transcripts and financial aid. All three colleges share a SIS coordinator who oversees the operations of the system. This

collaborative project would not have been possible without the contributions of each campus.

New Website: The three UnityPoint Health colleges also collaborated on new websites for each campus. A common design template was selected for all three colleges with each campus adding their specific content.

The new website design is intended to help create consistency and brand awareness for the colleges and is ADA compliant. Like the SIS project, the new websites would not have been possible without the participation of all three campuses.

Collaboration on the Legacy Program

UnityPoint Health – Allen Hospital, in partnership with Allen College and the UnityPoint Health – Allen Foundation launched the Allen Legacy Program (ALP) in 2020 to provide a financial incentive for Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) students in exchange for a two-year employment commitment to work at Allen Hospital after graduation and successfully obtaining a Registered Nurse (RN) credential.

The ALP was developed to address a growing workforce shortage in nursing that was exacerbated by the recent global health pandemic.

The ability to provide BSN students up to \$20,000 over the course of their final two semesters of education provides significant financial support and gives the ALP participants an opportunity to graduate with smaller, if any, student loan debt.

The funding is provided through a combination of philanthropic donations

provided to the Allen Foundation and also part of the operating budget of Allen Hospital.

The growth of the program has been steadily increasing from a total of 9 BSN students participating in 2022 to 30 BSN students in 2024. As of July 1, 2024, a total of 72 Allen College students and graduates have either been hired or pre-hired at Allen Hospital. The ALP has awarded over \$1.3 million dollars of tuition support to program participants.

The ALP is truly a collaborative partnership that has resulted in many of Allen College's best and brightest graduates working in and making positive contributions to the Cedar Valley community.

Doctor of Physical Therapy program receives accreditation by CAPTE

Allen College's Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) Program was granted accreditation status by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE) on October 31, 2023. Graduates are now eligible to sit for the National Physical Therapy Exam (NPTE) for physical therapists. Successful completion of the NPTE is required for licensure in all 50 states.

Allen College's inaugural class of DPT students enrolled in the spring of 2021 and graduated with the Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) degree on December 2023.

"We are proud of this accomplishment and are confident in our mission of graduating skillful, knowledgeable, ethical and professional physical therapists," remarked Dr. Eric Arguello, DPT Program Director. "The first graduates were highly successful in clinical education and will be contributing to meeting the needs of patients in the areas of musculoskeletal, neuromuscular, pediatric, and acute care."

The three-year, hybrid program is the first of its kind in Iowa. The program combines didactic online education that students can complete from anywhere and hands-on lab immersions at Allen College's campus in the newly constructed physical therapy lab which includes the Van G. Miller Anatomy lab. Additionally, students complete clinical experiences at sites across Iowa and U.S.

"I am so proud of the professionalism, dedication and determination of our DPT program faculty and staff to develop the program and earn accreditation," said President, Dr. Jared Seliger. "The end result is Allen College can provide highly qualified and competent physical therapists who serve a crucial role in healthcare organizations across the country."

Trustee Dr. JoAn Headington recognized
